FEW journalists can boast five decades in the industry and even fewer in the same town but Liz Lawrence has been the beating heart of Narrandera's iconic masthead for

Liz attributes this longevity in the industry to a love of the written word and a passion for country newspapers and the vital role they play in rural towns.

Born in Narrandera, she is managing editor of The Narrandera Argus, which celebrated its 140th birthday in 2020.

Liz started her career working on the social pages - a female cadet journalist who some wrongly believed couldn't be trusted or considered skilled enough to cover the "meaty" issues involving law enforcement, local government and farming issues.

However, she was determined to succeed at a career she pursued since high school years, gaining the trust of local farming identities while reporting on agricultural issues.

Changes beyond their control have had a major impact on Narrandera and its newspaper, including declining rural population, loss of employment opportunities and young people heading to larger centres for lifestyle and careers.

These came with declining advertising and readership for the



Argus, like many other rural and regional newspapers. But Liz hopes that the town's newspaper can be part of a revival.

The Narrandera Argus is now a weekly newspaper instead of a bi-weekly but has adapted to the modern world including changes in technology such as introducing its website and Facebook page, relevant rural pages and rebranding the masthead. The newspaper is now a regional masthead covering issues in the neighbouring shires of Coolamon, Lockhart, Murrumbidgee and Leeton.

Liz has seen massive changes in the newspaper over the past half-century, originally bashing out stories on a trusty old Remington typewriter then handing them to the typesetters and compositors to prepare for the old printing press.

While she wasn't there to see the

Argus change from a broadsheet to a tabloid in the 1960s, she was there for all the rapid changes in technology which have come since.

As a journalist she was a major contributor to the June 1981 Narrandera Argus Centenary publication and the August 11 1985 Centenary of Local Government in Narrandera publication, researching and writing a substantial part of the content.

But the special publications she was most proud of were the ones she initiated as managing editor in 2013 (Narrandera Sesquicentenary) 'Narrandera Remembers ANZAC 100 Years' in 2015.

"Every journalist has a favourite and I think the ANZAC edition was one of the best tributes to local soldiers that you would ever see - it was a highlight of my career to give recognition to these wonderful men and women," she said.

"This is why I love country journalism – it's the chance to tell the stories past and present of the wonderful people who live in these communities who would otherwise go unrecognised.

"I also love the diversity of country journalism - you can be telling a profound story about people suffering at the hands of higher authorities who would otherwise never get their stories out there and also becoming a trusted part of the community that people want to share their stories with. Mind you there are some stories that can never be shared or the *Argus* would be out of business and money! But it's not all serious stuff and there's been some funny stories to tell that are unique to country newspapers."

Liz's advice to young people seeking a career in journalism is to begin their careers with a country newspaper.

"They will get a great grounding and can then decide if there's a particular area they are keen to specialise in," she said.

"Working for a rural newspaper can be tough but it can also be very challenging and rewarding as it has

"I believe country newspapers like the Argus play a vital role in rural towns and are the mouthpieces of their communities - they cover topics that are unique to country living and give country people a chance to have a say in their community.

"Don't count us out yet - if we remain relevant and true to our cause of reporting local issues we will survive – we just need the support of our local communities and that includes reading the paper because that makes us attractive to advertisers."



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

Each of the Riverina doctors will be working at their town's local medical practice while continuing their training under RVTS's Remote Stream.

"This means they can continue to provide the essential, quality local medical care that their communities need, while still completing their specialist training and gaining access to the latest advances in rural General Practice. It really is a win-win situation for the doctors and their communities."

RVTS has been training doctors for over 20 years, and in that time has supported more than 400 doctors who have delivered primary health care in over 300 rural, remote and First Nations

Help wetlands with plantings

WHILE officially National Tree Day is August 1 Narrandera Landcare Group will be having a community planting morning at the Narrandera Wetlands on Sunday, May 30.

NLG's activity manager Glenn Currie said members preferred to plant this time of year as it gave time for the seedlings to establish before the brunt of winter hits and achieve a better survival rate.

Narrandera Wetlands was established in 2005/06 to filter the town's stormwater before it enters the river

It has since become important habitat for a large range of birds, a popular walk for townspeople and a handy educational resource for the local schools.

"Our Landcare group first planted at these Wetlands around 15 years ago and we've been planting here on ad-hoc basis ever since," Mr Currie said.

"What we are doing this year is adding to the under-storey by filling in a few gaps in the plantings with ground layer plants to add to the biodiversity of NLG started planning for this day last September.

They were awarded a grant through the Murrumbidgee Field Naturalist's Environmental Grants Program and with the help of numerous volunteers have propagated over 1500 native seedling at their small nursery situated at the Narrandera Food Garden.

National Tree Day started in 1996 and is Australia's largest community planting event. It's a day where the community can get their hands dirty and be pro-active in caring for the environment.

"Three local schools are helping plant in the week leading up to the day, and we hope the community will come down on Sunday and give a hand," Mr Currie said

"We'll be starting at 9am and have trowels and gloves for our volunteers. Leeton Toyota is providing tremendous support for the day, and Narrandera Pizzeria will be opening up specially to make us pizza for lunch as a thank you to all the volunteers.

Water quality at top of list

WATER quality and maintaining local streets and roads are at the top of the list of priorities for shire residents according to the 2021 community survey.

A total of 68 per cent of respondents called for more investment from Council in the town's water supply.

This was closely followed by greater investment in unsealed roads with 63 per cent and youth services at 55 per cent.

A total of 31 per cent of residents rated the small town feel of Narrandera as its most valued aspect, followed by 16 per cent enjoying the natural environment, 14 per cent the lifestyle, and 13 per cent valuing the peaceful atmosphere.

Forty per cent of respondents believed key priorities were attracting business and employment to the area.,

A total of 39 per cent of residents wanted an improved water supply, 27 per cent called for more youth services, and 24 per cent improved road

Just 17 per cent wanted the crime rate addressed Councillors heard five areas where Council is

encouraged to consider more investment include the Narrandera town water supply, local unsealed roads and services, and activities for older residents and those with a disability. Five areas where Council could improve levels

of satisfaction include transparency, support and promotion of business establishment and growth, water supply, provision of information to the community, and ease of engaging with councillors and staff. Overall, 77 per cent of residents are at least somewhat satisfied with the performance of Council over the last 12 months. General manager George Cowan said residents

could analyse the survey outcomes on the Council

"Without surprise, the important issues to the community have been those important to the Council for a long time – the number one priority is to continue to improve the water supply and we have programs in place to achieve that," Mr Cowan said.

"We also take on board the improvement and further work on business support and attraction, and communication and engagement with the community.' The top high satisfaction areas were swimming

pools, library services, and the Narrandera sports

The low importance areas were supporting cultural opportunities, bike paths and community buildings.

Cr Barbara Bryon said the survey was a huge ask "I did find it interesting community events

"It is worth \$380,000 fully equipped and is set up for motor vehicle accidents and general land rescue. This vehicle can carry three operators - each side of the vehicle is set up for ease of access.

"We have hydraulics on the rear and Holmatro battery operated rescue equipment on the side – each new squad vehicle has an identical layout somembers can find equipment if working with another squad.

This light rigid vehicle is an auto and was fully equipped, $registered, presented to \, us, and \,$ has been a long time coming.

"It will definitely improve our response times and our capability.'

Mr Macdonald said the squad now had 15 active members and three trainees working through their accreditation program.

Lingen honoured for tireless work

NARRANDERA'S Bryan "Wal" Lingen was awarded for five decades of devotion to the Volunteer Rescue Association last week.

Wal joined the Narrandera squad in April 1970 when the building simply consisted of today's meeting room, with no roof or floor. He went on to help form and support squads at Leeton, Binalong, Corowa, Coleambally and Balranald.

Wal recalled one of his first call-outs was to recover the body of an Ardlethan doctor when his car was swept away by flash flooding.

Another incident involved recovering the body of a bank manager from the flooded Edward River at Deniliquin with the help of the army and rescue squads from Narrandera, Balranald and Deniliquin.

Wal said the 1974 flood reached a record height in Narrandera.

"It was a big learning curve I learnt a hell of a lot very quickly and it proved very useful in years later," he said.

Wal was promoted to regional coordinator and also elected state secretary in 1995, serving until 2018, and is the VRA Patron.

VRA life member and past president Ray Gill said under Wal's leadership and guidance, the Narrandera squad developed into one of the best equipped and trained rescue units in the state.

"Your untiring fund raising, coupled with your ability to not only stretch every dollar but also make it multiply, made it all possible," Mr Gill said.

"I recall the efforts you put into building the shed, fitting out the training room and acquisition of equipment.

"Your service to the VRA in various roles, including regional coordinator and secretary, exhibited the same dedication, commitment and

"I greatly appreciated your commitment to the welfare of all the volunteers, and participation in major emergency operations such as the 1997 Thredbo landslip, 1999 Newcastle disease virus outbreak and the 1999 Sydney hail storms."

Deputy coordinator Glen Hehir, of Leeton, paid tribute to Wal for the knowledge he had passed on to the region's squads.

"It doesn't matter if you have been there for 15 years or are fresh and new, there is always something to learn from listening to him talk about jobs, tools and equipment," he said.

"He leaves a long-lasting legacy.

Tim's train passion celebrated

FROM humble beginnings, to greatness was the way Boree Creek's favourite son, Tim Fischer, AC was remembered by the hundreds at the unveiling of his memorial sculpture on Sunday.

The sculpture of Tim, sporting his Akubra, sits astride an engine and its tender on a length of track, and takes pride of place in the Tim Fischer Community Park at Boree Creek.

Urana artist Andrew Whitehead used scrap metal to create the likeness of Mr Fischer, titled 'The Last Train from Boree', and it was completed in June 2020 to much online acclaim.

However, the planned installation and unveiling of the sculpture – scheduled to coincide with the first anniversary of Mr Fischer's death in August 2020 – was cancelled due to COVID-19.

Several notable Australian leaders joined Federation Council, Judy Brewer and the Fischer family at the event, including the NSW Governor Margaret Beazley, former Ambassador to the Holy See Melissa Hitchman, Member for Albury Justin Clancy, Member for Farrer Susan Ley, Major Sarah Winter and Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack.

Federation Council mayor Patrick Bourke said it was a great honour to host the memorial event and unveil the Tim Fischer Memorial Sculpture.


Cr Bourke said it was an amazing piece of artwork that will forever honour Mr Fischer's passion for both trains and that of Boree Creek.

Under Assassin's Gate

The Argus continues the serialisation of Matt Quade's new book *Mindless Thug Iraq-Haiti-Libya* this week with Chapter Four.

AT the end of the US-led invasion in mid-2003, the US government classified Iraq as a 'permissive' environment.

This is corporate jargon and doublespeak for; 'Iraq is safe to work in but we're not going to use the word 'safe' unless something goes wrong'.

The 'permissive' classification had one main purpose, to reduce the bill from the US construction companies for their private security contractors

Hence, the reason we initially began ferrying US engineers around Baghdad, and beyond, in non-armoured vehicles. At the same time, the US government was impatient to commence the reconstruction of Iraq and immediately began shovelling billions of dollars to these same construction contractors. On the ground the sudden ramp up in activity still caused serious manpower shortages for all the private security companies despite the 'permissive' classification.

Ex-military personnel on the close protection teams were calling old colleagues out of civilian life to come and join the financial bonanza at the time. And inter-company poaching of personnel was rife.

In the midst of the commercial difficulties of supplying manpower, the Iraqi insurgency, and the targeting of Iraqi civilians working for CF (Coalition Forces), was rapidly moving to another level. January 18, 2004, marked the beginning of mass casualty attacks against civilians by the terror element of the Iraqi insurgency. That day our team proved the maxim, 'In this job, I'd rather be lucky than good.'

Two close protection teams were required for the reconstruction of a water treatment plant in Northern Baghdad. The plan was very simple. The first team would depart with the engineers.

The second team was to wait four minutes then leave and join us at the site. Two teams travelling together would have only doubled our value as a target. We were the first team. We left our fortified compound and drove through Assassin's Gate where hundreds of Iraqi workers were lined

up to enter the secured Green Zone. Outside the main checkpoint, facing the city, one US soldier stood guard over the whole entry process behind a pile of sandbags with a machine gun. I will never forget thinking, I wouldn't want his job, he was static, totally exposed, on the external side of the Green Zone and facing the public.

Back at base, the second team was preparing to leave. Greg was an ex-Brit Army grunt and the Team Leader for the second crew. He was walking toward his client and vehicles when he crossed an old Army mate he hadn't seen for years. Handshakes, 'How are you mate?', a brief chat, with a promise to catch up once the tasking to the treatment plant was finished.

'Have to go mate, got a job on, we're due to leave.' By this stage, our team was clear of Assassin's Gate and out into Baghdad. Greg's team departed and drove toward the exit at Assassin's Gate. As they approached the massive gates 500kg of low velocity explosives ignited right in the middle of the Iraqi civilians lining up for that day's work.

Greg's team had just enough standoff to survive the blast. As he told us later that day, they were physically pushed back into their seats from the force of the blast. More importantly, if he hadn't stopped to briefly chat to his mate, the whole team, including the engineers, would have been evaporated in the middle of the blast.

Despite most media reporting an immediate death toll of 24, at least 80 Iraqis were killed by the explosion. Many died from their horrific wounds over the following days and weeks.

Lucky rather than good. That was us.

Science ambassador role

A CHARLES Sturt University academic from Albury-Wodonga and former Narrandera Fisheries scientist has been selected for a prestigious program that aims to strengthen connections between policymakers and the science, technology, engineering and mathematics sector.

Fish and river management ecologist in the Institute for Land, Water and Society Professor Lee Baumgartner, a former scientist at the Narrandera Fisheries Centre, is one of 17 STEM Ambassadors for Science and Technology Australia (STA)'s 'STEM Ambassadors Program'.

Approximately 100 science and technology professionals applied for the program, which pairs the selected STEM Ambassadors with their local federal MPs and Senators.

The STEM Ambassadors will meet with their assigned Parliamentarianthroughout the year to bring their scientific expertise and networks to assist evidence-based policymaking.

Professor Baumgartner has been paired with NSW Senator Perin Davey and plans to use his place in the program to address NSW's water issues and add his scientific expertise to the water debate.

"NSW is dealing with some significant water security challenges and is implementing a significant infrastructure program," Professor

Baumgartner said. "It is important that the program and associated policy decisions are informed by best-available science – this is the main reason I decided to apply for the program. Scientists often get too caught up in reporting their results in a technical sense and don't take the time to discuss this with decision makers to ensure the results find their way into decision making."

Senator Davey said she was excited to have been connected with Professor Baumgartner and believes their interests are closely aligned.

"I am pleased to have been selected to participate in the STEM Ambassador Program as we know how important it is for science to inform policy in so many critical areas," Senator Davey said.

"Lee is based at a regional university and his expertise in fish ecology and natural resource management is very much aligned with my background in water policy and my passion for regional education.

"I congratulate Science Technology Australia on developing a program that will improve the links between policy and STEM across a wide range of policy areas and across all parties."

ScienceandTechnologyAustralia Chief Executive Officer Misha Schubert welcomed the new STEM Ambassadors and congratulated them on their selection from a highly-competitive field.

Mega battery for Point

DARLINGTON POINT

A 100-MEGAWATT battery to be built at Darlington Point will help to power schools, hospitals and Government buildings across NSW under the state's new electricity supply contract.

As part of the \$3.2 billion 10-year contract, awarded to Shell Energy and Edify, a 100-megawatt battery will be built alongside the Darlington Point Solar Farm, providing critical dispatchable electricity prior to the closure of the Liddell Power Station.

The battery, to be built by early 2023 and operated by Edify, will support up to 35 local jobs during the construction phase and will mitigate concerns around supply shortages related to the closure of the Liddell Power Station

Energy Minister Matt Kean said the deal delivers great value for money and electricity security for the people of NSW

"The NSW Government is the second biggest energy customer in the state and we are using our purchasing power to leverage new dispatchable capacity to help power our schools, hospitals, traffic lights and tunnels," Mr Kean said. "This battery will help to keep the lights on and keep costs down during peak energy periods, and support more renewable energy to come online."

"Providing products and services that help large energy users decarbonise and meet their emissions goals is a key focus for us in assembling the building blocks of a cleaner energy system in Australia."

"With our successful track record in forming partnerships to deliver storage projects, we are excited to head back into the Riverina community and continue our work with Shell Energy and the NSW Government to make this innovative project a reality," Mr Cole said.

Step up in emergency response with truck

GRIFFITH

FIRE protection and emergency response in the Griffith community will be enhanced with the handover of a new \$530,000 pumper to Griffith Fire Station.

The new appliance has a pump that supplies up to 3000 litres of water a minute for firefighting operations and a Compressed Air Foam (CAFs) system to fight chemical, petrol and bush fires. It is fitted with a GPS navigation unit and an electronic message board on the back to warn motorists of emergency operations. The engine meets stringent emission standards.

Minister for Emergency Services David Elliott said this new vehicle would serve to improve emergency response in the Griffith area, providing even greater protection for local residents.

"FRNSW do a great job in responding to a variety of emergencies across NSW so it is pleasing that the NSW Government has recognised the wonderful work they do by providing new vehicles to improve emergency response," Mr Elliott said.

"Griffith firefighters responded to 451 fire and emergency calls in 2019/20 so this new pumper will be well utilised for the protection of the Griffith community."

Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) Deputy Commissioner Field Operations Jeremy Fewtrell said FRNSW continued to provide its firefighters with the-line capabilities to protect NSW families. "This new pumperwillgive our firefighters the edge when responding to various emergencies," Deputy Commissioner Fewtrell said.

"An upgrade such as this ensures that our firefighters have the best equipment and the latest technology to ensure the safety and protection of themselves and the people they protect. Now we have these vehicles in our fleet, we are even better prepared to protect the irreplaceable, which is our loved ones and community assets."

FRNSW replaces on average up to 40 vehicles each year with brand new and modern vehicles as part of a \$17 million annual program.

Sealing our local roads

LOCKHART

LOCKHART Shire Council has won grant funding under the Fixing Local Roads Program to seal a 400m section of Prichard Place, Lockhart.

Sealing of an additional 230m to Green Street West is estimated to cost

Lockhart Council won funding under the Fixing Local Roads Program to seal Prichard Place, Lockhart. The project includes sealing 400m of the current gravel section of Prichard Place at a cost of \$206,550 comprising a grant of \$103,275 from the Fixing Local Roads Program and \$103,275 from Council. The road reserve between Prichard Place and Green Street is currently unconstructed. No funding was allocated in the 2020-21 draft budget to seal the additional section from Prichard Place to Green Street West.

Council pushes heavy

LOCKHART Shire Council is still working on a proposal to upgrade The Rock to Boree Creek rail line under the Inland Rail Interface Improvement Program.

For years the Council has advocated for the upgrade of The Rock to Boree Creek rail line to the same standard (axle loading) as the main Sydney to Melbourne rail line.

The branch line is described as 'light rail" meaning that wagons cannot be loaded to their maximum axle weight.

Lockhart Council fully supports the upgrading of line to heavy rail to enable the more efficient and cost effective use of rail infrastructure. An application for funding under the Fixing Country Rail Program was submitted by Council but was unsuccessful. With the advent of the Inland Rail project the opportunity was taken to once again make representations regarding this project through the Inland Rail Interface Improvement Program (II Program), which aims to assist in the development of project ideas that have the potential to boost the benefits that flow from the Inland Rail project.

The Australian Government Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications advised council the Department and its Independent Assurance and Technical Adviser had assessed the proposal to determine whether it met the requirements for eligibility for the II Program. including alignment with the Country Lines Improvement Program (CLIP) principles and confirmed the proposal had been assessed as eligible for the II Program. The proposal was included in a list of 15 project proposals announced by the Australian Government to receive support under the II Program.

 $The \, Department\, allocated\, Council's$

proposal to its specialist business case adviser, Ernst and Young, who will work with Council to develop the proposal.

The first step will be to arrange an inception meeting with the Department and Ernst and Young to discuss the working arrangements under the program and enable work to begin on the development of a project plan.

The Australian Government has committed \$44 million to the II Program to assist in the development of project ideas. The II Program supports the development of ideas for more productive rail-based supply chains and improvements to capacity on key country rail lines that intersect with Inland Rail. These ideas can come from industry, local operators, governments and the community, or others that are interested in taking advantage of the long-term benefits of Inland Rail.

The business case adviser is provided at no cost to Council.

Museum footpath upgrade

PAVING works in front of the Green Gunyah museum on the corner of Green and Urana Streets Lockhart and The Rock Avenue of Honour have been allocated a further \$61,732 under the Drought Communities Your High Street program.

Funding under the Unspent DroughtCommunitiesProgram Extension program was made available to undertake these footpath improvement works on the corner of Green and Urana Streets, Lockhart and The Rock. An amount of \$200,000 was allocated to projects to improve footpaths and disability access.

A report presented to the Council meeting in February 2020 included a range of subprojects to improve footpaths and disability access.

Lockhart Council resolved late last year to submit applications under the "Your High Street" grant program for The Rock Avenue of Honour Masterplan and a component of the Lockhart Central Business Area Masterplan, involving the improvements on the north west corner of Green and Urana Streets including the extension of the heritage payers in front of the Greens Gunyah Museum.

The application extended the paving and kerb works to include the section from the old Gunyah Hotel to past the museum and linking with the existing footpath along Green Street West. The total estimated cost of the works was \$111,320. This submission was not successful as according to DPIE the \$15 million grant program was significantly over-subscribed and the quality of proposals was high, with many worthy projects not receiving funding as a result. All footpath projects in Lockhart Shire under the DroughtCommunitiesProgram Extension were completed except for the section in front of the museum in Lockhart. The Drought Communities Program Extension funding spent on footpaths in The Rock was \$105,980 and \$122,288 was spent on footpaths in Of this program funding

allocated to footpaths, \$61,732 remained unspent and Council has now resolved to spend it on the museum footpath.

Burning Seed Festival snuffed out for 2021

THE Burning Seed Festival 2021 normally held at Matong State Forest will not be going ahead this year.

After many meetings and discussions, the decision was made by the event's Town Council.

Reasons given for the cancellation included the ongoing uncertainty around COVID-19 and the desire to protect the local communities

around Matong from a large number of people, as well as the inability to obtain cancellation insurance.

A spokesperson for the organising committee said they were aware that many other events and festivals were being planned in 2021, but an event of the Burning Seed size was just

"Unfortunately, it's not as simple as reducing the participant numbers

because a large amount of money is spent on infrastructure and services prior to the event - the majority of which would be non-refundable." a spokesperson said.

"On top of this, we also have a lack of volunteers in the organisation. We had many people step away for personal reasons during 2020 (it was a tough year for us all) and we also had a large number of key people resign from key positions within Seed, as well as from groups such as the restructure committee.

"These people took a wealth of knowledge with them. We will be addressing this and answering questions around the future of Burning Seed over the coming weeks."

Options being considered for this vear include a digital burn as done

2020 and it is likely that micro burns

will be organised by various local burner groups. The Town Council will be discussing these options with theme camp leads, entities and other members of the community.

"The one thing everyone agrees upon is when the Burning Seed gathering happens again, the community will be there-stronger and more determined than ever before," the spokesperson said.



OVER 4000 spectators are set to visit The Spirit of the Land Festival as Lockhart gears up for its 2021 return.

Some of the best fine art and sculptures will be on display in another highly anticipated exhibition in the second week of October.

Last year Lockhart Shire Council had to cancel the festival as a result of complications with COVID-19.

This year fingers are crossed a blockbuster event can welcome thousands of spectators to the town.

"Last year it would have been around this time and maybe a bit earlier but we pulled the pin while we were a few months out planning for it," Lockhart general manager and organiser Peter Veneris said.

"This is the signature festival for our local government area and we hope to expect several thousand people over the Saturday and Sunday

in October. The two things that underpin the festival are the farm arts sculpture and fine arts and photography exhibitions, we close the main street and get a number of market stalls too.

"It's the farm arts sculptures we are probably best known for and they are quite amazing to see and we get a good range each year."

This year the prizemoney is back on the table. In total there will be over \$20,000 in prizemoney given and a National Farm Art Sculpture Award prize of \$10.000.

The prizes are an indication of how important the festival has become and the quality of the work that has been on display for decades.

"The idea for it began following one of the worst droughts in district history," Mr Veneris said.

"It was a way of giving some of our farmers on the land something to do

with their skills turning scrap metal and various pieces into art work and a way of keeping them mentally active and occupied time.

"In time it came to symbolise the resilience of people living and working on the land and over a period of time probably the people that make the art sculptures and submit them have become more professional. The farm arts sculptures in particular are the highest quality and its unique. It's a form of artwork you really can't see in many other places in one whole exhibition and it's the uniqueness of it and it attracts people. Having the added attractions of stalls, music and fireworks display on the Saturday evening, particularly for families there will be something for everyone."

Funds to boost female participation rates

LOCKHART Shire Council has been allocated \$769,390 under the fourth Communities Fund (SCCF).

The Council will apply under the community amenity and community service infrastructure stream for the redevelopment of the former GrainCorp property in Lockhart and the Yerong Creek cricket ground irrigation system.

It is yet to determine priorities for the 'female participation in sport and enhance female sporting facilities' funding stream from projects relating to the Lockhart, Osborne and The Rock recreation grounds at a workshop to be held before the Council's June meeting.

All of the funds allocated to Lockhart Shire under Round 1 of the

The minimum grant under the Round 4 guidelines is \$50,000.

Council General Manager Peter Veneris said earmarking 50 per cent of the funding to enhancing female sporting facilities limited eligible projects within Lockhart Shire to the main recreation grounds and sporting ovals.

"Consultation has commenced with the management committees of the main recreation grounds with a view to identifying projects which would meet the criteria of increasing female participation in sport and enhance female sporting facilities," he said. As a result of this consultation

These projects totalled \$636,970 which exceeds the minimum 50% threshold for the female sporting funding stream of \$384,695.

The closing date for applications is June 25 2021. A co-contribution is not required for applications submitted under the SCCF Program.

"Attention to detail and effort, if we bring that we can compete," Darley said. I looked at the weekend, Matt Rainbird and six others were out, and the next seven in aren't ready for senior footy. If they bring effort I'm OK and we lose on ability tip the hat to the opposition."





The "Chook Run" was won by Judy Heckendorf with a 25 nett and the Vets winner was the ever persistent Larry Steele with a 31 nett.







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
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Nimmo plays for flag

From a cheese factory to a MIA centenary

ONE of the longest running sporting events in rural NSW will celebrate its 100th year in Griffith in June.

The Centenary MIA Open - an annual three-day tennis tournament will be played over the Queen's Birthday weekend on June 12-14.

The tournament has survived droughts, floods and World Wars since its birth in 1920.

"Just after World War I, a group of well-heeled farmers met at a local cheese factory and decided to start an annual tennis tournament," Griffith tennis veteran Lorraine Maxwell said

"The event was initially staged at various farms across the district, attracting residents from across regional NSW, who would travel to Griffith via horse and carriage."

"The tournament was actually played on Banna Avenue – where Zecca's Restaurant is now located

– and various other courts before finding its current home at Jubilee Park in 1955.'

These courts were built and named after Griffith tennis's most

iconic figure, Jack Shannon. "Jack was married to the Griffith Tennis Club," according to former MIA Open champion Barbara Dixon

"The life-long bachelor won a

lottery, then dedicated his life to Griffith tennis

"He would volunteer at the club every day and coached hundreds of children for free.'

Griffith's most well-known family the Mackays- also had a long association with town's tennis.

Don Mackay, a prominent businessman and politician who tragically became Australia's first political assassination, was a keen social player.

But it was his older brother Bill who excelled on the court - playing barefoot as he won six MIA Open titles between 1946 and 1954.

"The rain-soaked 1955 tournament was one to remember. Bill Mackay teamed up with Nev Boland," Mrs Maxwell said.

"Both men played shoeless against Temora opponents with the ball splashing muddy water into their faces. A number of Griffith MIA Open participants have gone on to win national titles, including Des Tyson, Daryl Henderson, Lyn Andreazza, Danny Dossetor and Margot Dixon. This year, there will be 46 different

WITH recreational freshwater fishing worth \$300 million to the economy, a local author has launched a complete fishing guide to the Murrumbidgee for anglers.

Martin Asmus, NSW Department of Primary Industries, and Dr Jamin Forbes have published the Fishing Atlas for Murrumbidgee River – Gundagai to Balranald.

The full colour guide details the recreational opportunities along the length of the river and lists every public access point, the river conditions, fishing potential, boat launching facilities, campsite quality and the availability of items such as toilets, barbecues, tables and seats.

GPS coordinates are supplied for the approach to every entrance to the reserves, parks and other river access points.

There are also plenty of fishing hints and fish identification and capture information to help make the stay in the area an enjoyable one.

The 15 detailed maps cover Gundagai, Wantabadgery, Oura, Wagga Wagga, Currawarna, Galore, Narrandera, Yanco, Darlington Point, Yarrada Benerembah, Carathool, Uardry, Hay, Maude and Balranald.

Mr Asmus said the first edition was published in 2006 and detailed Gundagai to Narrandera, with the second edition covering Narrandera to Balranald.

"They were both revised and were one of the publisher's biggest sellers,"

"There have been changes in the Crown Lands along the river so it was a good opportunity to revise both books and combine them.

"The first book took us months while the second one took us a week of solid visiting each spot.

"This revision took us three trips visiting each of the 130 sites."

Martin and Jamin have been friends for 25 years and have fished the entire length of the Murrumbidgee with the Hay weir pool their favourite

"It has good Murray cod fishing and is a really cool spot-around Gundagai is another lovely spot," Martin said.

"Narrandera rates very good for fishing with mainly Murray cod and Golden Perch – people come here from interstate to fish for Murray Cod.

"There are boat ramps at Brewery Flat, Rocky Water Holes and Buckingbong. In terms of boating facilities and navigable water, Euroley has a boat ramp and Piper's Reserve is planned for a boat ramp. The stocking programs enormously contributed to both Murray Cod, trout cod and Golden Perch."

Mr Asmus said the stretch of the Murrumbidgee at Narrandera was healthy and contained platypus.

"We are not affected by blue green algal blooms like other areas and have lots of habitat structure," he

"The idea of listing the camping sites wasn't to take away from local caravan parks but give people another option."
