

Local land values go gangbusters

NARRANDERA, Lockhart and Temora shires are among the hot button areas in regional NSW for rural dryland property with prices reaching a staggering \$12,000 per hectare.

According to the Rural Bank's overview of 2021 Australian farmland values released on Tuesday, cropping land in the Riverina is highly sought after.

The median price per hectare in the region soared by 12.4 per cent in 2020 to \$5010 per hectare off the back of a 20.3 per cent increase in 2019.

A total of 160,836 ha of land in the region was traded in 2020 with the majority of transactions in the \$2000-\$4000/ha bracket.

There were more than 60 transactions at \$10,000/ha plus.

The report found farmland remained tightly held in the Riverina region strengthening demand and lifting the median price per hectare, particularly at the top end of the market.

There was strong growth recorded in several shires including Narrandera, Carrathool, Temora and Edward River. In contrast, median price per hectare eased slightly in Berrigan, Cootamundra-Gundagai, Murray River and Wagga due in part to an increased proportion of mid to low value properties returning to the market.

The decrease in mid to low value transactions was most evident in the shires of Narrandera, Federation and Bland.

Joann Heeney, Rural Bank Wagga Wagga, said the on-farm confidence was driven by low interest rates, robust commodity prices, and favourable seasonal conditions.

"Increased water allocations in the Riverina renewed confidence in the region after a tough year in 2019," Ms Heeney said.

"Buyers were quick to react to opportunities, willing to compete on price to secure limited buying opportunities."

QPL Rural agent Jason Haines said there was buoyant demand for dryland cropping properties in Narrandera, Barellan, Lockhart and Grong Grong.

"It is an era of the private family farm expanding – there is some corporate interest in the south in that dryland space but family farms are taking the opportunity of low interest rates to buy the next door neighbour or blocks close by," Mr Haines said. "This is either for family members or to expand the existing operation. We are seeing record sale prices popping up in the dryland areas."

Mr Haines said the market was moving quicker than what the valuation processing times were.

He said there was a shortage of dryland properties to list with the emergence of the family farm as the major player in the industry over and above corporate buyers.

"They are being tightly held at the moment – with the prices people are talking about now there could be more come onto the market but anything that hits the market is being snapped up," Mr Haines said.

"A lot of the dryland country is over \$2000/ acre (\$4940/ha) regardless of where you are."

Prices have been achieved recently in excess of \$5681/ha (\$2300/acre) at Barellan and \$12,350/ha (\$5000/acre) at Lockhart.

Mr Haines said confidence had returned to the irrigated property market. "We are getting renewed interest out of other irrigation districts, particularly the Murray system, wanting to move into the Murrumbidgee because of the way our allocations are looking this season. Mr Haines has irrigated farmland at Coleambally listed at around \$4500/ha and greater. "Irrigation land in general is very good value at the moment compared to what is happening in the dryland space," he said.

"That dryland space is going leaps and bounds and it has to do with scalability and labour. Corporates are taking check as they have experienced massive capital gain and are wondering how long it will roll on for.

"The dryland area looks like we are in for another big year if we could get another rain."

Across the state, the median price per hectare reached a record \$5855 in 2020, jumping by massive 15.6 per cent on the back of low interest rates, strong commodity prices and favourable seasonal conditions.

In 2020, a total of 1.4 million hectares traded in NSW, resulting in a 15.6 per cent median price growth in 2020 and a compound annual growth of 8.1 per cent over 20 years.

The western region recorded the highest growth in median price per hectare of 37.5 per cent while the southern region increased by 12.4 per cent. The number of farmland transactions finished at 3073 for 2020 across the state valued at \$3.7 billion.

Police seize cannabis in Riverina

OFFICERS from the Murrumbidgee Police District Proactive Crime Team have charged a man after uncovering a hydroponic cannabis set-up in the Riverina area.

About 8.45am on April 30, officers from Strike Force Kincora, a team of investigators from the Murrumbidgee Police District targeting hydroponic cannabis cultivation with links to local organised crime networks, executed a search warrant on a property on Old Willbriggie Road at Hanwood.

During the search of a bedroom, police located a sophisticated hydroponic cannabis set-up and seized 16 small cannabis plants. A further search of the premises revealed an underground bunker with a trap door concealed under the living room carpet. Ten mature cannabis plants, all being grown under heat lamps, were seized by police.

Also found during the search was a quantity of cannabis leaf, methylamphetamine and MDMA and a trench knife, which is classified as a prohibited weapon. Officers also seized equipment consistent with the cultivation and supply of cannabis.

A 53-year-old man was ar-

rested at the scene and taken to Griffith Police Station.

He was charged with five offences including cultivate prohibited plant, alter or add to electricity installation for metering, possess prohibited weapon without permit and two counts of possess prohibited drug.

He was refused bail and was due to appear at Griffith Local Court on May 1.

Signs of a hydro house can include:

• Increased security measures (roller shutters, fences, vicious dogs in the yard),

• Increased use of electricity,

• Increased use of water. • Illegal connection to electrical supply,

Condensation on windows,

• Continual running of generators and lights.

• Disposal of large amounts of garbage.

• Large quantities of chemicals and fertilisers around the premises.

 Locks or other methods in place to prevent access to the electricity meter box,

• Discarded plastic containers and strong odours (fertilisers, liquid and bagged growing cultures).

Historic altar returned home

A CARVED wooden altar with gold plated detailing dating back to 1908 has emerged from storage after more than 40 years and resumed its rightful spot in Narrandera's Catholic Church.

Father Bradley Rafter said a wooden cross was relocated to a prominent spot on the ceiling so the altar could be affixed below the stunning stained glass windows in the sanctuary at St Mel's.

Father Rafter said the return of the iconic altar would spark memories of weddings and baptisms for many local families.

"In the original church in 1908 there were two side altars along with a high altar against the front wall (of the sanctuary)," he said.

"In the 1970s when the Pope said the priest could turn around and face the people, the altar was moved forward, the side altars removed and the cross attached to the front wall.

The intricately carved altar was stored in the St Mel's museum and was refurbished by volunteers.

"It was gone for about 40 years and we have brought it back - the tabernacle doors are gold plated and the ciborium is timber," Father Rafter said.

"It was installed the week after Easter and the response has been great – a few said it has taken them back to their childhood or memories of their wedding at the altar."

Father Tony Oboshi has joined St Mel's as an assistant priest from Leeton last November. Originally from Nigeria, Father Tony works

as the chaplain at St Francis de Sales College, does communion rounds in Narrandera. hospital and nursing home visits, and other parish work.

"I came to Australia to train as a seminary to become a priest," he said.

"I got to know people in Narrandera years ago when I worked here for a month so it is like a home coming - I don't feel like a fish out of water here."

On behalf of Murrumbidgee Primary Health Network, I would like to acknowledge the COVID-19 vaccination rollout is complex and challenging.



Heavens above it's the moon

STAR gazers had a field day last week with the Super Moon lighting up the night sky.

Narrandera Astronomy Group coordinator Kelly (who declined to use her surname) captured this stunning image of the Super Moon with a Nikon D610 camera and a 70-300mm lens set at 1/400 sec, f11 and at ISO 320.

The Super Moon occurs when the moon is at its point closest to earth, making it appear bigger and brighter.

Kelly is mentored by Leeton astro-photographer Mick McNamara since forming the group at Narrandera's first "star party" at Gillenbah in November.

Mr McNamara studies the Sombrero Galaxy and M83 which is 15 million light years away.

Kelly said the small, productive group is a support network, allowing people to get comfortable with their telescopes, using mini dobs and learning how the equipment works.

She said the Super Moon was an ideal opportunity to get the general public interested in astronomy.

"The group is rolling but it's more if a mentoring and oneon-one online support group," she said.

Kelly told star gazers to watch out for the Lyrids meteor showers in the north-east night sky at midnight for the month of May

The international space station is also visible on the horizon from May 6-12 within a few hours after sunset along with a total lunar eclipse on May 26.

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ew career on track

A TAFE NSW qualification has James Flack on the frontline of a new career keeping lives safe while improvements are made to local roads.

James, 28, was one of a recent group who completed Traffic Control qualifications at the TAFE NSW Narrandera Connected Learning Centre in March.

Each of the graduates went on to find employment on local road projects including the \$600 million Newell Highway upgrade.

A welder by trade, James' move from Queensland to settle in Narrandera found him seeking a new career. He contacted Sureway Employment and Training in the hope of finding something local.

They pointed him to the Traffic Controller course at TAFE NSW. The idea was for him to gain some qualifications in an area where employees are in demand.

"I was after a change from welding and it turned out traffic control was just the ticket. Our TAFE NSW teacher was exceptionally good at making sure we knew the information we needed," he said. "We also had plenty of time for hands-on practical work, so I felt well prepared for what I had to do from day one on the job. There's quite a lot of responsibility that comes with managing traffic around work sites."

TogainhisStatementofAttainment in Control Traffic and Implement Traffic Control Plans, James had to understand the risks involved with working on roads, establish signage around work sites, be able to use radio

communication and the Phonetic Alphabet. As part of the short course, students cover both the theory and practical aspects of the job, including attending a simulated worksite.

With histraffic control qualification complete James quickly found work on the highway upgrade. "I like working outdoors and this

is a job with plenty of variety. We're always setting up on new sections of road, so each day is different." he said. "I get to see a lot of faces each day and most drivers are friendly. I've had some offer me snacks and drinks and wind their window down for a bit of a chat. It's nice to know people appreciate what I'm doing."

TAFE NSW Civil Construction Teacher Greg Walsh said the short course was a relatively quick way to learn job-ready, practical skills, and earn an industry-recognised qualification.

Walking scorched earth

COLLINGULLIE author Matt Quade brings the inside story of the aftermath of the Iraq war to life in his new book, *Mindless Thug Iraq-Haiti-Libya*.

Matt is originally from Tallimba, and served with the French Foreign Legion from 1994 – 1999.

He was deployed to Bosnia in 1995 with the Legion under NATO's Rapid Reaction Force.

Matt has since worked as a private security contractor (close protection, project manager, country manager and independent contractor) from 2003 to 2018 in Iraq, Haiti, Libya and Somalia.

He worked directly with the local populations in each theatre and holds a special affinity for the people of the frontier town of Kirkuk in Northern Iraq.


Chapter one

IN 2003, after the invasion of Iraq, US President George W. Bush stood on the deck of an aircraft carrier and announced to the world 'Mission Accomplished'.

Coalition Forces had had a steamroller military victory over the poorly equipped, largely conscript, Iraqi Army. The invasion and its after-

a decade before the actual assault on Iraq began in 2003.

The first component of the plan consisted of a dual role for one of America's largest corporations.

Initially, it was to supply all of the post-conflict logistics to Coalition Forces such as convoy transports and private convoy security that was supplied in addition to US military protection (often to the great frustration of the US military, another story in itself).

And, secondly, to secure and extract Iraq's oil reserves. This 'honour', and the billion-dollar 'cost-plus' contracts associated with these tasks were bestowed upon the Hall-

iburton corporation. George Bush's Vice President at the time, Dick Cheney, had departed as Chairman and CEO of Halliburton in 2000.

The second plank of the US plan was the reconstruction of Iraq's infrastructure.

This task was bestowed upon the Bechtel Corporation, the largest private construction company in the world.

The reconstruction task did not just consist of vital Iraqi infrastructure such as power, water, bridges etc. but also schools, hospitals, local medical clinics, sewerage plants and other civilian facilities. At this point I must state that the first two-and-a-half years working in Iraq was for Bechtel as a private security contractor.

The first taskings were in Baghdad in 2003 and 2004 on the four-man close protection (bodyguard) teams accompanying US engineers on their reconstruction missions.

The second Bechtel project ran from 2004 to 2006. My penance was to run a private security force of Arabs, Kurds and Turkmen providing external security to the reconstruction **Photos supplied.** of one of Iraq's largest power

stations, a prime target of Iraq's insurgents. Bechtel ran a 'clean' operation and possessed the corporate culture that was required for a theatre such as Iraq being

for a theatre such as Iraq being largely populated by military veterans turned engineers. The third plank of the US plan also involved two com-

ponents. The first, to implement a scorched earth policy toward Iraq's political system, essentially the dictatorship of Saddam Hussein that maintained power via the Sunni Muslim minority over the Shia Muslim majority.

This policy largely involved what was known as the 'De-Ba'athification' process, an elimination of all of Saddam Hussein's Baath Party members from public office.

It was similar to the Denazification process that the US implemented in Germany at the end of World War Two.

The policy was of course taken to an extreme. Schoolteachers who had joined the Baath party in the pre-war years simply to gain employment were also fired from their positions. The second component was to rebuild the entire Iraqi political system from scratch based upon a model that largely mirrored the US system.

The logistics, oil recovery and reconstruction aspects of the US plan had major problems, little of which came to fruition over the following years.

The third plank, the political plan for Iraq, was an unmitigated disaster.

In the early years of the Iraqi occupation the US installed its own provincial-style Governor. This Governor's aggressive pursuit of the De-Ba'athification policy was one of the reasons for the complete collapse of Iraqi society in the following years that we were working in Iraq.

By 2006 a full-blown sectarian bloodbath between Iraqis, and a two-pronged insurgency against all 'foreigners', was well underway.

Lives left at risk by staff shortage

DENILIQUIN

NSW Labor is urging the Berejiklian Government to take immediate action to address the serious crisis affecting rural and regional health services after explosive evidence was given by local doctors at a public hearing of the Upper House Inquiry into Rural, Regional and Remote Health Services in Deniliquin.

Deniliquin Health Action Group chair Dr Marion Magee gave evidence all five doctors at Deniliquin Hospital would meet on Sunday to consider resigning en masse from their positions. This would leave Deniliquin Hospital with

no doctors at all. Dr Magee said local health services have deteriorated markedly with local doctors being forced to work 120 hours a week and a nurse practitioner is no longer available at Deniliquin

Hospital. Shadow Minister for Health Ryan Park said doctors at Deniliquin have been placed in an intolerable position because of this Government's neglect.

"The Berejiklian Government must meet with local doctors and provide them with the resourc-

es they need to care for people, Mr Park said. "This is serious evidence from Dr Magee and I am concerned local doctors in Deniliquin feel they have no other way for their voices to be heard.

"I know the Deniliquin Health Action Group hasn't made this decision lightly. These are people who love their community and want to provide the best possible care. Brad Hazzard cannot continue to ignore them."

NSW Labor also has called on the Government to urgently increase investment in NSW Ambulance as figures highlight a system in crisis with people left waiting nearly 45 minutes to access what is at times life-saving treatment.

Mr Park said it was critical paramedic recruitment be increased and fast tracked to ensure people got access to emergency care when they needed it most.

"Lives are been put at risk because of chronic underfunding and understaffing and we have paramedics who are under enormous stress and pressure because of the shortages of staff right across the system," he said.

Tower upgrade for Coolamon

COOLAMON

COOLAMON Shire Council will undertake a structural upgrade of the Coolamon telecommunications tower.

Council received a request from NSW Police to undertake additional improvements to the tower.

Future Engineering and Communication will undertake the improvements to the tower as well as base strengthening at a cost of \$125,350.

Council was advised the work proposed by NSW Police was not what would or had taken the structure above the 80 per cent tolerance allowance.

Discussions with industry representatives made it apparent that when other users made improvements to their networks on towers they had been changing the parameters in their engineering assumptions to ensure that reports were provided that were 'under tolerance acceptances'.

A Council report stated this was how some telcos ensured they were not required to contribute to any tower upgrade costs or lessened the ability for competitors to use available space.

Council was now faced with a structural upgrade to the tower.

The required work met the criteria of a recent funding round for the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program and recent savings made on street light upgrades which allowed Council to include the structural upgrade of the telecommunication tower as a project for funding.

THE humble tea towel is making a comeback as a medium for promoting Riverina regional communities.

A former Barmedman artist, Jo Woods, is printing her sketches of Coolamon, Leeton, Temora, West Wyalong and Albury onto Polish linen tea towels, capturing the essence and character of the main streets.

Jo, now living in Albury, has also completed a tea towel design for the newly opened Whitton Malt House.

Her design for Leeton features the iconic Roxy Theatre, about to undergo refurbishment.

"I used to live between Temora and West Wyalong on a property at Barmedman, and often I would go to Tom, Dick and Harry's in West Wyalong for coffee," she said.

"I began to look at the shape of the bended main street and saw it for an absolutely amazing artwork.

"I started to see those places were eventually going to disappear because generally there is not a lot of maintenance put into main streets, apart from the facade of buildings.

"I thought these places may eventually not look like this anymore and it was a celebration of home. Many of those street scapes are well over 100 years old and unless there is a lot of maintenance put into those buildings, they are not going to survive another 50 or 100 years."

Ms Woods said often people living in these towns wanted something to celebrate their sense of place and give to family as gifts. "I came up with the concept

of drawing and I thought how can I make the drawing in multiples, and came up with tea towels," she said. "Tea towels are practical

but can also be framed or used as a wall hanging.' Jo has also drawn street

scapes in Rutherglen and Beechworth.

Each tea towel is a contemporary drawing with a sepia wash to suggest past and present.

"All of them are a recognisable genre and are printed on high quality Polish linen in Australia," Ms Woods said. "Leeton Shire Council com-

missioned me to do a run of the Roxy Theatre – after visiting the Roxy I feel I have a special relationship with it because when I was drawing it I really had to concentrate and not miss out on anything that was important. I had to look at that drawing with an eagle eye otherwise the whole drawing wouldn't have been authentic.'

Ms Woods is happy to draw other towns or places of destination within the region to celebrate their sense of place. She goes under the business

of Anabranch Creative. "An anabranch is where a river or watercourse goes off itself and rejoins itself at another place - that was metaphorical for people who have been away from a place and

want to come back to explore their roots. "It's like their anabranch

in life."

Water innovation to be explored

PEOPLE from across the diverse communities of the Murray–Darling Basin will come together to share the latest knowledge, achievements and challenges in water management at the inaugural MDBA-hosted annual conference River Reflections in Griffith in June.

MDBA Executive Director of Basin Strategy and Knowledge, Vicki Woodburn said the June 9-10 conference is designed to provide the space and time for productive connections and conversations between the diverse communities of the Basin, including industry, agriculture, natural resource management, First Nations and tourism.

"This is the first annual conference. Each year a different region in the Basin will host the event. The Program has been developed in collaboration with community and industry leaders – an approach that enables focus themes to cover areas of most interest as well as highlight perspectives from the host region," Ms Woodburn said.

"The program includes a broad line-up of speakers sharing information about river and ecosystem health, First Nations Peoples' interests and contributions to water management, water use innovation, and climate challenges, among other topics.

"It's not just about listening -there are plenty of opportunities for lively interactions and discussions as well.

"And while this first conference is being hosted in Griffith, the focus is both local and Basin-wide, and open to anyone from anywhere to attend either in person or online.'

Among the range of people involved in the conference is

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Geoff McLeod of the non-profit organisation supporting improved irrigated farming, Southern Growers.

Geoff will provide insights on farming systems adaptation which he's been directly involved with in the Southern Riverina, and give conference participants the chance to ask questions

"Sharing information is an important way our farming community can gain confidence to adopt different approaches to improve irrigated farming. I welcome the opportunity to talk about our experiences, challenges and the solutions we are working towards," Mr McLeod said.

Also presenting at the conference is Braeden Lampard from Ozfish Unlimited, which works to protect and restore our waterways and help other recreational fishers get involved.

Braeden will provide insights into their plans and projections for supporting ongoing recreational fishing in the Basin over the next five years, and take part in discussions with conference participants.

The conference delivers on a 2019 Australian Government election commitment to demonstrate effective community engagement through an annual water conference in regional locations.

The first day will be streamed live online so anyone across the Basin or the world can participate. Due to the COVID-19 pan-

No more secrecy in water trading

THE ACCC has made it clear state governments need to change their laws to end secrecy in water markets, according to Member for Murray Helen Dalton.

A forum at Griffith on April 28 presented the key recommendations and findings of the ACCC's Murray-Darling Basin water markets inquiry final report.

The forum was attended by 40 irrigators, farmers, industry and government representatives.

Helen Dalton has urged the NSW Government to immediately implement a recommendation from Australia's competition watchdog to end the secrecy behind water trading within irrigation corporations.

"At the Griffith forum, the ACCC made it clear that state governments would need to change their laws to end the secrecy within our water markets," Mrs Dalton said.

"In NSW, there is no transparency over how irrigation corporations such as Murrumbidgee Irrigation and Coleambally Irrigation manage water held within their scheme."

Irrigation Corporations are private companies who operate water service infrastructure to deliver water to irrigators.

"In Victoria, water trading within irrigation corporations is recorded on a state register," Mrs Dalton said.

"But not in NSW, where irrigation corporations operate in complete secrecy.

"Water is the only market in Australia where you can make a \$1 million transaction and not even reveal your ABN (Australian Business Number).

"In response to a question I asked, the ACCC said their report recommends all irrigation corporations should be required to report water trading within its scheme to a central authority. It's up the NSW Government to change the law and make this happen.'

were sick of inquiries and had lost faith.

"We've had more than 100 inquiries and reports into water over the past 15 years," she said. "We know what's wrong, $the\,NSW\,Government\,needs\,to$ change the law."

The ACCC water markets inquiry was commissioned by the Australian Government and has held 10 public forums with more than 800 attendees, over 100 industry meetings and over 200 submissions received.

The ACCC compiled a data base of more than eight million water market transaction records from 2012-2019 for analysis.

The key findings included the total value of Murray Darling water entitlements were estimated at \$26.3 billion and the annual market trade was \$1.8 billion.

Farmer's water assets make up 40 per cent of their farm asset bases.

The inquiry found market information was fragmented, incomplete and neither timely nor comprehensive, and there was minimal regulation of water market intermediaries, resulting in irrigator confusion and conflicts of interest.

Market architecture is coming under increasing stress as water supply and demand changes and markets develop. and in combination, market deficiencies are resulting in a loss of trust in the fairness of markets.

The ACCC closely examined trading by four large investors, four small investors and 11 major agribusinesses. The large investors held

seven per cent of high reliability/security entitlements in the Southern Connected Basin while the large and small investors accounted for 11 per cent of allocation volumes purchased and 21 per cent of those sold in 2018-19.

Major agribusinesses were buyers of 25 per cent of allocation volumes traded in 2018-19 and 38 per cent in the first part of 2019-20.

The ACCC investigated unusual transactions, water holding times, market power, price manipulation, inside information and collusion.

The ACCC did not find evidence investors exercised market power or manipulated prices, and it was difficult to regulate what is not recorded.

The forum heard poor guality public data contributes to misconceptions, misinformation and low market confidence.

There is no single entity responsible for ongoing, effective monitoring of trading in the Basin.

The creation of a water marketer's agency was an ACCC recommendation for market regulation and surveillance, market information and evaluation, and advisory and advocacy

The ACCC wants to see a requirement for advice from the Water Markets Agency to inform decision making.

Other recommendations include improving inter-zone trade processes, implementing common water markets data standards, create a public water market information platform with trade information and market announcements, and a water market education program.

Robust accounting for carryover and storage losses needed to be developed along with a strengthening of metering and monitoring, improving inter-valley trade mechanisms and clarify rules for the deliverv of environmental water.

The Commonwealth and states are considering the recommendations and formulating responses, with some recommendations requiring legislative change.

Dams and bore rebate

FARRER'S farmers impacted by the recent drought will be apply for funding from the Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme to help make their properties more drought resilient.

Minister for Resources, Water and Northern Australia Keith Pitt said farmers will now have until June 2022 to utilise the \$100 million in Australian Government funding allocated to the program.

"The scheme can be used towards small scale on-farm drought proofing water projects, including buying and laying pipes, installing water storage devices, such as tanks

and troughs associated with stock watering and desilting given another 12 months to dams and water bores," Minister Pitt said.

Under the EWIRS, eligible farmers claim up to 25 per cent of expenses for on-farm water infrastructure, to a total rebate of \$25,000, of which half is provided by the NSW Government.

Member for Farrer Sussan Ley said some farmers in the electorate had missed out on obtaining the full rebate when the scheme became oversubscribed in NSW.

"With this extension of the

program I can assure those local farmers who had already invested money in good faith,

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they will now be at the head of the queue to be reimbursed," Ms Ley said. "After campaigning on behalf of our community, I am delighted NSW has now joined with the Commonwealth in funding all of these much needed on-farm works.

"Farmers value the rebate because it helps keep livestock watered and permanent plantings alive in a drought - importantly it also improves productivity so they are better prepared for the next drought at some point in the future."




LEAF COLLECTION SERVICE

Council's leaf collection service will commence on Monday 10 May 2021 and will operate in the areas shown on the map during the specified times, subject to any variation that may be required due to mechanical failure, unacceptable weather conditions or inability to collect all leaves in that area on those days.

The assistance of residents is requested in raking leaves into street gutters or in easily accessible piles, otherwise leaves cannot be collected. It is also requested that materials, other than leaves such as tree limbs, rocks and cans, not be included in leaf piles as they will damage the machine and may cause injury to the operator and delay the collection process. Any piles containing rocks, bricks or pieces of timber including prunings, etc will not be collected. Residents are also reminded not to leave a substantial number of leaves for long periods around the base of trees as it may cause injury to the tree.

If an area is not completed on the specified day, it will be collected the following week as per schedule.





Ngurru Kujungka are a not-forprofit community sport organisation that launched the 'Football Boots for Remote Communities' program.

AFL clubs across the Riverina have pitched in to offer their old boots to send to the Western Desert for residents to play in with the majority of players playing barefoot, mostly on dirt.

Coleambally's Carl Chirgwin has been heavily involved in the clubs work to get players and volunteers to send close to a hundred pairs of boots.

"They put the call out for spare boots and most clubs have some thrown in the shed every year so we thought our club could get on a rally,' Mr Chirgwin said.

"It doesn't matter what size either. "We had a massive influx of boots come in from kids and adults.



"Adam Norton who is working in an AFL position working out in remote communities notified us as well, saying these kids can play but mostly barefoot. We're glad to be part of this boots on the ground work."
