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LEFT OUT IN THE COLD

PROTEST action by local nurses and midwives outside Narrandera Hospital yesterday demanded the scrapping of the public sector wage freeze planned by the NSW Government.

The NSW Nurses and Midwives' Association Narrandera branch president Denise Zak is appalled at the government's proposed plan.

"Nurses always work so hard, but even more so in the current time of COVID 19," Mrs Zak said.

"We can't believe that our government expects us to be risking our lives every day and to do more for less.

"We are seeking support to help us to continue to care for our community by putting pressure on our Cootamundra MP Steph Cooke and Treasurer Dominic Perrottet, to stop the wage freeze."

Ms Cooke said she was listening to what constituents were saying and expects the issue to be raised in the NSW Parliament.

"I recognise many in the community have faced hardship during COVID-19, particularly those who have suffered financial loss," she said.

"No one has been untouched by this pandemic.

"I respect the hard work of all our nurses, midwives and other public sector workers at all times and am truly thankful for their efforts."

The NSW Government plans to change a regulation to freeze the pay of public sector workers for 12 months when their awards and agreements expire.

Nurses, cleaners, police and firefighters are among the 9757 public servants in the Riverina facing wage cuts.

NSW Labor Leader Jodi McKay said the NSW Government had thanked the heroes who risked their lives and served NSW during the COVID-19 crisis with a pay cut.

"This is a kick in the guts for people like health workers and teachers, bus and train drivers, cleaners, security guards and many more," she said.

"Our public servants have been heroes during the pandemic. They deserve a medal, not a pay cut."

Denise Zak agreed, saying the nurses state-wide are feeling hurt.

Mrs Zak said the 2.5 per cent pay increase was aligned with the Consumer Price Index.

"We work hard as nurses every day of the week but at the moment during this pandemic it has been very full on for us even in the regional areas with new protocols and practices we have had to embrace in a short time," she said.

"The police, ambulance and teachers are all in the same boat at the moment – all NSW nurses feel unsupported.

"We are valued members of the community and we support

our community.

"Some of us say we are born nurses, we don't just take it up as a job and have this underlying commitment, love and passion for caring and helping people.

"At the minute it feels like nobody cares about or wants to help us."

Labor Shadow Minister for Industrial Relations Adam Searle said at a time when communities were struggling, taking wages from the pockets of 9757 workers in the Riverina was wrong.

"The best way we can stimulate the economy in the Riverina is by supporting people to spend their wages in local businesses, at supermarkets and other shops. That's how we keep regional economies afloat during this crisis," he said.

Member for Murray Helen Dalton said her party remained staunchly opposed to a pay freeze for frontline nurses, teachers and police following a zoom meeting with NSW Treasurer Dominic Perrottet last week.

"Basically, this pay freeze is about robbing regional workers to pay for Sydney vanity projects," Mrs Dalton said.

Funds boost for Council

NARRANDERA Shire Council is set to receive almost \$1 million in funding for road and community projects.

Local government councils in Farrer electorate will receive over \$15 million as part of the Australian Government's boost for the projects.

This allocation includes \$997,363 to the Narrandera Shire Council. Leeton Shire Council \$656,388 and Murrumbidgee \$1,008,021 were among the other councils to benefit.

Member for Farrer Sussan Ley said the investment would support local jobs and businesses and boost local economies struggling under the effects of COVID-19 and ongoing drought.

The \$1.8 billion package includes the establishment of a new \$500 million Local Road and Community Infrastructure Program and the bringing forward of \$1.3 billion of the 2020-21 Financial Assistance Grant payment.

Ms Ley said the new program was based on the successful Roads to Recovery program and would enable local councils to deliver priority projects with a focus on upgrades and maintenance to local roads and community infrastructure.

Local road projects to be delivered under the program include but are not limited to constructing or improving bridges, street lighting and heavy vehicle facilities such as rest areas.

A broad range of community infrastructure projects will be eligible, including new or upgraded bicycle and walking paths, community facilities, and picnic shelters and barbeque facilities at parks.

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Michael McCormack said supporting councils to improve local roads and community infrastructure would have lasting economic and social benefits for communities, particularly those in the regions.

“Projects could include constructing or improving bridges and tunnels, street lighting and heavy vehicle facilities such as rest areas.

“Providing support for social infrastructure projects such as new or upgraded bicycle and walking paths, community facilities, picnic shelters and barbeque facilities at parks, will help communities, especially those in regional and remote areas, stay connected,” he said.

Air League flying

NARRANDERA'S original RAAF World War II training rooms are set to have a makeover thanks to a \$7971 Community Building Partnership grant.

Member for Cootamundra Steph Cooke presented the cheque to Leeton-Narrandera branch of the Australian Air League captain Bob Manning on Thursday.

The grant will be used to install reverse cycle air-conditioning and floor coverings in the building at the Leeton-Narrandera airport.

Narrandera Shire councillor Narelle Payne also donated \$500 to the Air League in memory of her father and RAAF mechanic Roy Payne.

Captain Manning said Cr Payne's donation would enable the flight simulator to be completed.

Instructing pilot Craig Day teaches the Air League cadets, aged from 11 to 18, on flight using the simulator.

“This is a more modern version

of what they had in World War II when this building was constructed,” Mr Day said.

“It gives students a realistic experience for what it is like in an aircraft. We also take the students for actual flights.

“We have some students keen to become pilots, and are in the process of getting their recreational pilot's certificate.

“We have three girls applying for their pilot's certificate with one keen to become a fighter pilot.

“The training stands them in good stead whether they want to go military or civilian. We also focus on the engineering side, including composite building techniques.”

The squadron is now a composite squadron with young girls able to join.

Captain Manning said the Air League depended on community fundraising and donations for its survival.

Church now open for mass, prayer

NARRANDERA'S Catholic church, St Mels, is now open for mass and prayer with restrictions.

More people can attend religious services, weddings and funerals from June 1 but worshippers will be asked to maintain social distancing and changes to communal practices will be required.

Parish Priest Father Bradley Rafter said up to 50 people were permitted to attend Mass, not including those assisting in the Mass such as organist, readers and servers.

There will be a new sheet at the back of the church each Friday for people to add their names for Mass times for the following week. Anyone wishing to come to Mass must write their names on that sheet.

“People dropping into the church to pray also need to add their names to a separate sheet – the reason being that if there was an outbreak from St Mel's it could be traced back to whoever was in the church that day so they could be treated and isolated,” Father Rafter said.

He said this was in accordance with State policy and the policy from the Australian Catholic Bishops.

NSW Premier Gladys Berejiklian has announced up to 20 people can attend weddings, 50 at funerals and 50 at places of worship, subject to the four square metre rule.

Health Minister Brad Hazzard said extensive COVID-19 outbreaks in places of worship and amongst choirs' overseas highlights why the NSW Government has been cautious in easing restrictions.

“NSW Health has developed a checklist to help places of worship create a tailored COVID-19 Safety Plan to ensure they can keep participants as safe as possible,” he said.

In other news, for Catholic parishioners in this diocese Pope Francis has appointed Bishop Mark Edwards the Bishop of the Diocese of Wagga Wagga, which includes Narrandera.

Bishop Edwards is the Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Melbourne and will move to Wagga to take up his new post in the Riverina.

The Diocese has been without a bishop for more than three years.

Vaccine in stock

NARRANDERA residents have been urged to get their flu vaccinations as soon as possible by TerryWhite Chemmart.

The pharmacy still has plenty of vaccine in stock and has retained adequate supplies throughout this season.

As lockdown restrictions gradually ease and Australians slowly adjust to life beyond the confines of their homes, the rate of influenza infection can only increase so now is the time to ensure vaccination.

A rush on flu vaccinations early in the season saw some pharmacies stripped of stock earlier than anticipated.

TerryWhite Chemart pharmacists vaccinated more Australians in the first four weeks of launch in early March than in the 2019 season and

the pharmacies are on track to vaccinate more Australians this year than the last two seasons combined.

While the flu vaccination won't protect people against COVID-19, it is the best way to reduce the risk of influenza which kills hundreds of people in Australia each year and leads to thousands more hospitalisations.

The 2020 influenza vaccine covers the four most recent strains of influenza and will help protect for approximately 3-4 months.

Influenza seasons of previous years have extended beyond winter, so getting a flu vaccination will help protect people for the remainder of the 2020 flu season.

Customers can call in to the pharmacy during opening hours six days a week.

New road projects

A \$230,000 project to rebuild a section of the Burley Griffin Way at Moombooldool has been announced by the NSW Government.

Also in the funding announcement is \$163,000 for rebuilding a section of the Newell Highway at the Federation Way intersection at Morundah.

The rebuilding of the Newell Highway at the Goldfields Way intersection north of Wyalong has been funded at \$600,000, and \$600,000 to upgrade five culverts to improve drainage on the Goldfields Way at Barmedman.

Minister for Regional Roads and Transport Paul Toole said the stimulus, funded by the NSW Government's \$2.3 billion COVID-19 package announced in March, has allowed Transport for NSW to bring forward and deliver projects in addition to its planned program of work.

“Across the regions, we've accel-

erated \$100 million of big and small projects – projects that will help deliver safer, smoother and more reliable journeys for local communities right across the State,” Mr Toole said.

“More than 70 projects have already kicked off or will in the next few weeks, with more projects being assessed for the next financial year.

“This will provide a much needed boost to regional communities by supporting jobs and businesses through the sourcing of local supplies. While other activities have been restricted during COVID-19, infrastructure projects continue to forge ahead.”

“We're also fast tracking widening of the Newell Highway – a key freight corridor – and investing in a significant boost to safety on the Mitchell Highway near the South Australian border with the addition of 400 kilometres of rumble strips.”

Under cover wash

WITH the Newell Highway at Narrandera carrying an estimated 650 heavy vehicles per day, the town's new truck wash is already being well used.

Since a soft launch on April 14, more than 70 stock and bitumen trucks had already used the service located at the Red Hill Industrial Estate.

Constructed under NSW Government's Fixing Country Truck Washes program, the facility caters for stock carriers during the special sheep sales, those servicing the JBS Australia feedlot and regular cartage.

It uses potable water but the waste water is transferred to sediment pits and settling ponds before being irrigated over the 4ha site.

Narrandera Shire Mayor Neville Kschenka said the truck wash allows the cleaning of trucks and floats up to B-triple length.

"It also accommodates bitumen sprayers which a lot of truck washes don't, and is part of a national truck wash network," he said.

"it is important for disease control to eliminate spillage as they travel around, and encourages people to stop in Narrandera take advantage of other facilities while they are here.

"Access is by an electronic key system and it is open 24 hours a day."

Cr Kschenka said the project dated back to August 2016 and thanked local residents, transport operators and industry organisations for advocating

for the truck wash.

Livestock, Bulk and Rural Carriers Association president Paul Pulver said the organisation had successfully lobbied to receive \$10 million for Fixing Country Truck Washes.

Mr Pulver said successful truck washes had been established at Finley, Wagga, West Wyalong and Cootamundra.

He said \$5 million of the funding had been rolled over into Fixing Country Roads but the LBRCA continued to lobby the NSW Government on truck wash facilities.

"If anything does go wrong in the agricultural areas we need these washes – if there is a disease people won't be allowed to go from Narrandera to Wagga to wash out their stock crates," he said.

Mr Pulver said the nearest truck wash to Narrandera at Griffith was closed due to construction work.

"This new truck wash has road train access," he said.

Member for Cootamundra Steph Cooke said the Narrandera truck wash was the first in the region to be under cover and to cater for bitumen trucks.

Ms Cooke paid tribute to the project management role of Noel Creighton and Narrandera Shire team.

She said the project was funded with a \$650,000 contribution from the NSW Government and \$100,000 from Narrandera Shire Council.

Showgrounds are big winners with funds

BARELLAN will have the opportunity to cater for larger crowds at the Narrandera Shire's biggest tourism event, the Good Old Days Festival, with a \$244,992 grant for new toilet blocks.

Narrandera Show Society also benefitted in the funding round with \$35,000 to upgrade the Pioneer Hall kitchen and install a hot water system and disabled walkway.

Lockhart showground has received \$15,155 to paint the toilets, replace the fences and improve the heritage grandstand building.

For other local show societies, Ganmain received \$17,241 for internal road construction and resurfacing, Weethalle will use \$114,108 to refurbish its kitchen, install outdoor seating, and install power to its recreation ground, and Ardlethan has \$5000 for internal shelving and framework for its poultry shed.

Coolamon Showground received \$30,800 for a water infrastructure upgrade; install fire extinguishers and fire blankets; replace a damaged support column in the horse stalls; new stairs for the men's and ladies change rooms; replace exhaust units in the all-purpose building; patch, seal and paint toilets; and demolish an old shed.

Member for Cootamundra Steph Cooke announced 20 showgrounds across the Cootamundra electorate will benefit from \$1,779,153 in funding as part of the NSW Government COVID-19 stimulus package.

"I pushed many of our local show societies to apply for this funding which will be a boost to local traders and suppliers, and of course to our show societies who have already been doing it tough through drought and COVID-19," Ms Cooke said.

"This is a fantastic result for many of our

wonderful showgrounds who will now be able to undertake upgrades, build new infrastructure and improve these important community spaces."

For Barellan, the good news comes on the back of the heartbreaking decision by the Barellan Working Clydesdale committee to abandon this year's Good Old Days Festival scheduled for October.

Secretary Norma Zingel said the new two single-storey amenity and toilet buildings would enable the festival to better cater for the large crowds the event now attracts.

She said the new toilet block would also benefit the Barellan show and other events held year round at the showground.

Minister for Water, Property and Housing Melinda Pavey said this funding is part of \$25 million that will be spent over two years to improve showgrounds across the State.

"We will then follow through by allocating another \$12.5 million for more work across showgrounds to be announced next financial year," Mrs Pavey said.

"Showgrounds today are multi-use facilities for a range of activities from agricultural shows, rodeos and horse clubs to farmers markets, festivals, camping, men's sheds, and sport and cultural events."

Rocks spread kindness

BECKY Anne Merrett has been spreading much joy among local families with her painted kindness rocks popping up in every nook and cranny of the town's environs.

During COVID-19 isolation, Beck turned her hand to crosswords but quickly got bored and discovered the art of kindness rocks painting.

Rock painting is a hide and seek creative activity the whole family can be involved in.

Simply paint some rocks and hide them for others to find, and help to spread some joy in the community.

"My grandson found a kindness rock down at the Marie Bashir Park and on the back it had written Keep or Re-hide and the postcode for Belmont, NSW," Beck said.

"I didn't know of anyone painting rocks here so I thought let's spread a bit of love, happiness and kindness around.

"I'm a positive person who has been through a lot. Due to coronavirus I have been sitting at home a lot so I bought a rock painting kit to give it a go.

"I liked it so I ended up with two more kits, and then ended up with a dotting mandala kit which makes beautiful patterns."

At first, Beck was using rocks wherever she

could find them but received two big bags of river stones from a local resident on social media.

Each night she gets out her paint pens and completes five to seven rocks.

She has lacquered the special designs in marine varnish to keep in her own garden.

Beck has been placing the rocks along East Street, even hiding some in local retail stores, the Common, the river's beaches, Marie Bashir Park and Rocky Water Holes.

She has even dropped several off in Leeton and Griffith.

"When I do a rock drop, I give the kids a hint where they are, and people are commenting, and following on social media," Beck said.

"I have four grandchildren and they help me hide the rocks around."

The social media group, NSW Rocks, recommends using unpolished clean dry rocks (glass and ceramic rocks not recommended), while acrylic paints work best.

The rocks must be sealed before hiding them so they hold up to the elements.

You can write NSW ROCKS and the Facebook symbol on the back so people know what to do with their discovery. You can add Keep or Re-hide and your postcode on the back.

"So why not scrap the re-build of ANZ Stadium in Sydney, rather than cutting the real pay of frontline workers in Narrandera?"

"The best way to stimulate the regional economy is to put money in the pockets of our frontline workers.

"I've spoken to nurses and teachers in Griffith, Leeton, Deniliquin, Wentworth and Moama who are devastated by this proposal.

"Nurses have been redeployed to new areas and rapidly reskilled to provide quality care to our patients, and this is how the government repays us.

"We have seen this week the appalling way that the state's teachers are being treated. Frontline workers cannot accept this, we must all stand together and tell the Berejiklian Government this is not ok"

Squad gains new defib

NARRANDERA'S Volunteer Rescue Association squad has received an additional defibrillator as part of an equipment rollout across the state.

Member for Cootamundra Steph Cooke presented the squad with a \$2500 grant on Thursday towards the purchase of the defibrillator for installation in a response vehicle.

Squad captain Wayne Heidtmann said Narrandera was one of five squads in NSW to receive a defibrillator.

He said it could also be used for training purposes.

"If a medical emergency occurs and there is no ambulance in town, we can now act as first responders," Mr Heidtmann said.

NSW Volunteer Rescue Association Commissioner Mark Gibson said the investment means squads can spend less time on the street raising funds to purchase equipment like the defibrillators and more time in training their members.

"On behalf of the VRA squads at Taree, Barraba, Coonabarabran,

Cessnock and Narrandera I would like to thank Minister Elliott for the donation of the defibrillators," he said.

Emergency services volunteers have welcomed 31 new defibrillators for trucks and units from Ballina to Broken Hill.

Minister for Police and Minister for Emergency Services David Elliott said the \$77,500 investment is proof of the Government's continued commitment to protecting lives.

"These 31 additional defibrillators will go into the hands of our skilled SES, Marine Rescue and VRA volunteers, who all play a vital role in keeping communities safe," Mr Elliott said.

"We continually see how hard our indefatigable emergency service workers fight to keep us safe when disaster strikes and with a record \$1.7 billion budget, they will get every resource they need."

NSW SES Assistant Commissioner Sean Kearns welcomed the NSW Government's additional funding for the provision of defibrillators for the SES.

"The funding will assist NSW SES with the roll-out of defibrillators to our rescue vehicles and to our units," Mr Kearns said.

"A number of our regional units will benefit from this funding, including areas such as Broken Hill, Port Stephens, Wellington and Goolgowi."

Roadmap of rural ideas

LEETON not-for-profit organisations will now have a set of helping hands in the development, implementation and evaluation of projects suggested under the Investing in Rural Community Futures program.

Claire Williams, a Lockhart resident and part-time journalist with the *Argus*, has been appointed as a facilitator.

Leeton was chosen as one of three NSW communities to participate in the IRCF program, which was set up through a partnership between the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) and the Vincent Fairfax Family Foundation.

FRRR's IRCF program manager Alli Mudford said the organisation knows from experience how important it is to have someone on the ground to support organisations in their own community and help turn their ideas into sustainable solutions.

"One thing that we heard loud and clear from the Leeton community was how important facilitated discussions are and how important it is to have support to help bring groups and leaders together to talk through community needs and priorities," Ms Mudford said.

"That's why we are delighted to have Claire Williams joining the team as Leeton's facilitator

to support the community with the program."

Ms Williams lives on a cropping farm between Lockhart and Narrandera and is passionate about regional development.

She has spent several years working in both agriculture and communication, a background she believes will be beneficial when advocating for new opportunities in rural and regional communities like Leeton.

Both FRRR and VFFF have been inspired by the ideas that community representatives have put forward.

Local organisations have identified organisational development, governance, skills development and revenue sustainability are priorities for the Leeton community.

These suggestions have now been incorporated into a local Leeton roadmap for the IRCF program. These priorities were refined during workshops held online, due to COVID-19.

But there is still the opportunity for other suggestions to be included if organisations didn't get to have their say or their priorities aren't reflected in the roadmap.

Groups in this situation are encouraged to get in touch with Ms Williams.

Local organisations and col-

lectives in Leeton are now invited to apply for grants for projects that are reflected in this community roadmap.

Ms Mudford said FRRR staff and the newly appointed facilitator will work closely with local organisations to support them to apply for these, and future grants as part of Leeton's IRCF journey.

"Each community we're working with is different, with its own challenges, unique personalities and the depth and breadth of not-for-profits that work within its boundaries," Ms Mudford said.

"FRRR's role in the IRCF journey is to act as facilitators and supporters, to enhance the ability of local leaders to deliver the change they wish to see.

"It is absolutely a privilege to be working with the local leaders we've met in Leeton, and I can't wait to see what the future holds and how they turn these ideas into reality."

Applications for IRCF Ongoing Partnership Grants based on the Leeton community roadmap are now open and close at 5pm AEST, Friday, June 12, 2020. Grants will be awarded in August 2020.

Supporting families in times of crisis

COOLAMON'S Henley Carey is one of many sick youngsters from throughout regional and rural NSW who have benefitted from free professional flight and ground transport services thanks to a \$200,000 boost from the NSW Government to the children's charity Little Wings.

Flying out of Bankstown Airport, Little Wings does fantastic work, with the pilots and drivers donating their time.

Little Wings was established in 2012 and supports families across NSW. Children are referred to the Little Wings service by hospital staff with consideration to the child's medical condition, geographical location and regularity of travel.

Last year, Little Wings delivered 477 missions and supported 105 families. Approximately 85 per cent of the patients they support are children between the ages of 8-16.

Seventeen-month-old Henley is one of those 15 per cent of younger children with the disease. In the next few weeks he will receive a bone marrow transplant from his brother Darcy.

Their mother Alicia Carey said a viral infection in March led to Henley being diagnosed with a rare genetic disorder called Mucopolysaccharidoses (MPS), which threatened to claim his life before he reached adulthood.

His body does not produce an enzyme to break down large sugar molecules and causes swelling and impacts his heart, lungs, brain and bones and connective tissue.

While the transplant will not cure him, it will hopefully slow down the disease.

His parents both carry the gene that causes MPS but their other son,

Darcy, 3, does not.

For the past six weeks since his diagnosis, Henley has had to travel to the Children's Hospital at Westmead every week for enzyme replacement treatment to help his body break down the sugars.

The family have relied on Little Wings for free transport to Sydney hospitals for his treatment.

Despite the coronavirus impact on its funding, Little Wings has managed to keep flying with its three planes.

While commercial flights were grounded, children like Henley needed to be transported.

"Funding for this charity stopped but we still had to uphold our commitment to families," Little Wings chief executive officer Clare Pearson said.

Little Wings receives the majority of its funding through club grants and cash house bingo but the clubs were closed and events cancelled, so everything stopped overnight, with the charity forced to fly on its small financial reserves.

Minister for Regional Youth Bronnie Taylor said the emergency investment by the NSW Government would enable Little Wings to continue their life-changing services across the state regardless of the substantial toll the COVID-19 pandemic had taken on fundraising activities.

"Serious illness can turn family life upside down, and for those who live in the regions there is the added challenge of a long journey to the right care. That's why it is critical that Little Wings can continue to help families in their hour of need," Mrs Taylor said.

Frustration over water report and a lack of understanding

EDITOR, Some of us who were fortunate to have a rain-forced break took the opportunity to participate in two webinars – one featuring Water Minister Keith Pitt and the other featuring Basin Plan Inspector-General Mick Keelty.

I felt extremely frustrated, especially after listening to Keelty, who can see that there are problems, yet in his report he skips over the main issues and misses his opportunity to provide some real solutions.

Many of us are in the second and third decade of dealing with changes to water policy and management. We have seen a revolving door of Water Ministers, bureaucrats and advisors who come and go depending on their personal situations and ambitions.

But we are still here, suffering the consequences of bad management and an extreme lack of understanding about the mistakes, and more importantly the solutions which could return some common-sense to this vexed issue.

Our farmers are still trying to do what we do best – grow the cleanest and greenest food in the world. Our biggest challenge used to be weather and markets, now it's politicians and bureaucrats more interested in saving their own skins, rather than supporting good policy.

We would like the opportunity to work with governments to achieve this lofty aim, though it's unlikely this will occur as there isn't the political willpower.

Royal Commission needed to investigate flaws of plan

EDITOR, As more politicians and ever increasing industry and community members call for the disbanding of the present MDBA, even international academics are finally starting to wake up to disaster that has been created by the MDBA ignoring the damage being inflicted on Murray/Darling Communities by their flawed Basin Plan.

The McGill International Review, prepared by the Canadian university's Peter Hanna, presents a damning assessment of the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

Here are a few quotes from this highly regarded international organisation:

- The (Basin) Plan has battered river communities, severely weakened local supply chains, and has left many locals with a sense of hopelessness for what the future within the Basin holds.

- In recent years the MDBP has undervalued the importance of a productive agricultural system, instead wasting giga litres of water downstream.

- Once thriving water-dependent communities are experiencing economic volatility, sharp falls in investments, and uncertainty over the region's future.

- The (water) policy's imbalanced approach is indifferent to the objectives and aims stipulated under the Water Act 2007. Section 3(c) of the Act requires 'the use and management of the basin water resources in a way that optimises economic, social and environmental outcomes.'

- It is clear the MDBP's objectives fall short of addressing the econom-

As for the MDBA, it will continue spending the government's billions until there is no more, because it appears we do not have Ministers with the courage to implement the Productivity Commission recommendations.

Numerous politicians have called for the MDBA to be disbanded, but it seems Federal Government cannot muster the courage to take this step.

I sensed frustration from Mr Keelty with the MDBA. He's only been working with them for a period of months, so imagine how we feel after nearly a decade. It refuses to acknowledge either its own shortcomings or those of the Basin Plan and shows no interest in working with our communities on any solutions.

While watching the webinar featuring Mr Pitt, it was obvious he has not yet developed much knowledge of his portfolio. If I could be so bold as to offer him some advice: Start listening to people on the ground who know more about water management than your Canberra advisors.

If previous Ministers had taken local advice we would not be in the terrible situation that exists today.

Also, please take note of one of the very few comments from Mr Keelty that is 100 per cent accurate: "We have to find a better way to manage the system for the long term. We have to find solutions".

Our communities have got the solutions we just need to be heard!

Header takes a nosedive

COLEAMBALLY rice grower Perry Hardy got the shock of his life when his header nose-dived into a sink hole in the crop he was harvesting.

The Case header hit a boggy patch where a tree damaged by lightning had been removed and the hole filled in.

"The header went straight into it like quicksand," his wife Cate Hardy said.

This was despite the farm receiving 100mm in January and patchy storms since.

The couple is among just 15 growers to harvest rice in the region this year.

"It was quite cold while the rice was finishing off, evaporation wasn't as high and it was soft under foot," Cate said.

The couple harvested 41ha of Reiziq and the new variety Viand which suffered hail damage in a January storm and a post-storm cold water event.

"We got 10.2 tonnes/ha with a 10 per cent hail claim on the Viand

to work out at 11.5t/ha," Perry said.

"That 100mm was all in two days and most of it ran off. There wasn't even a moisture profile afterwards.

"The Reiziq averaged 11.5-12t/ha – the hail really knocked it around, one paddock in particular.

"The price for both varieties was \$750/tonne – there was not much in it given our water use was up more than we expected."

Perry said fortunately the seven-year-old header was bogged 20m from a road and was able to be pulled out with a tractor.

"I knew the hole was there but honestly I thought it would be okay," he said.

"I asked the boys to help but they were that busy on their phones taking photos for Snap-Chat and Instagram – nothing got done for the first 15 minutes."

"When you have sons on the money with the social media, it doesn't stay a secret for very long," Cate said.

The family has just finished

harvesting cotton and have sown barley and seed canola with oats yet to go in.

"I am quite happy with the cotton given the season – the yields appear to be down 10 per cent," Perry said.

"The better paddock went close to 12 bales/ha and the rest should have done that but it got hit by the hailstorm.

"The prices have come back a little but are still quite strong on a long-term average at \$500/tonne."

The couple use ground water to irrigate the crops and now have a nine per cent general security allocation.

Perry said there had been a "fantastic start" for winter cereals.

"The (general security) allocation announcement means for me going forward into next year, any inputs into our reservoirs should result in a general security allocation," he said.

"That's more positive than it was last year."

Rise in Bittern numbers

FOUR times as many Australasian Bitterns were found in the Bittern Friendly Rice grown by Riverina ricegrowers this year, compared to the benchmark set by the control sites.

In total 23 birds were sighted (compared to six in the control sites) and successful breeding was recorded in one crop.

Despite the challenging season, six landholders took part and grew a total of 277 hectares of Bittern Friendly Rice, according to project manager Anna Wilson.

"The rice fields of the Riverina provide a unique opportunity for the threatened Bittern with about 40 per cent of their population utilising rice crops over the summer months," she said.

"Given there's thought to be less than 1500 mature birds, that's quite remarkable."

The main aim of Bittern Friendly Rice is to maximise successful breeding – to do this, early permanent water is required with a minimum period of 130 to 150 days of inundation.

"Maintaining grassy banks and providing adjacent habitat in channels and dams are part of the incentive and are a favoured place for Bitterns to frequent as the season progresses – a great place to look for prey," Mrs Wilson said.

"We have also trialled growing small areas where additional urea was added so that the rice is taller and thicker to encourage early nesting."

Fox baiting is being undertaken across all farms taking part in the project as it's thought chicks and young birds are easy prey for these pests. Fox baiting will continue until late May to provide additional help to any young birds that are still in the area.

It has been a most unusual year, with little or no breeding

recorded.

The eerie boom of the male Bitterns was only heard at two sites in mid-January with fantastic results at one of the Bittern Friendly Crops with four chicks found.

When last seen the chicks were doing very well and it is assumed they successfully fledged.

The Boosting the Bunyip Bird Project is supported by Riverina Local Land Services with funding provided by the Australian Government's National Landcare Program.

The shorter days allowing for additional cleaning daily to ensure appropriate levels of sanitation remain in place for users, while Saturday mornings will remain closed for the foreseeable future.

Two computers with 30-minute session increments and reduced seating are available.

The Centrelink Rural Agency, home library service, call-and-collect service, free Wi-Fi and loans are all available for the community. However, library programs and hosting groups remain unavailable to the community.

The Visitor information Centre is open from 10am to 3.30pm Monday to Friday welcoming a maximum of five people at any time, with shorter hours also providing staff the ability to suitably clean the facility daily.

The team will assist visitors and other users through the recently installed intercom service until closure at 5pm.

Visitors can view but not touch the Big Guitar and also view the Tiger Moth through the window, but entry to the Tiger Moth building remains closed as it cannot be policed in keeping with the number of visitors permissible at any one time.

Both the Parkside Cottage Museum and Burrell Museum will remain closed for the foreseeable future and Council will advise once these facilities are open again.

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Nurturing bird habitat

LOCAL volunteers who have helped Narrandera Landcare over the years were thanked as part of National Volunteer Week.

Dismantling drug syndicates locally

DISRUPTING and preventing crime and anti-social behaviour is the focus of a new specialist police unit based in the Illawarra region but servicing the Murrumbidgee Police District, including Narrandera.

One hundred new high-visibility officers are to be stationed across the state.

As part of this commitment, the Southern High-Visibility Police (HVP) Unit has been formed to prevent, disrupt and respond to crime through high-visibility patrols of crime hotspots, roads, transport networks, local neighbourhoods and planned events.

The rollout started in January 2020, with six officers posted to the Illawarra to service the eight police districts including Murrumbidgee and Riverina.

The Southern HVP Unit proactively engages with individuals, groups and communities at risk of crime in an

effort to build intelligence-driven data and target anti-social behaviour.

Southern Region Commander Assistant Commissioner Joe Cassar said while the unit was based within the Lake Illawarra area, they were available to be deployed across the region at short notice.

"The Southern HVP Unit has the ability to be deployed wherever the demand is," Assistant Commissioner Cassar said.

"These deployments are on top of the work the unit does in proactively engaging with the community and assisting with strike force activity targeting drug supply. In the past six months the unit has assisted with dismantling drug syndicates in Wagga Wagga, Queanbeyan, Cootamundra, Young and the Illawarra."

The Southern HVP Unit consists of one sergeant and five constables.

Kissick had steel rods inserted into his spine and his long recovery involved daily physiotherapy for two-and-a-half years after the rods were removed.

His goal is to ride 80-100 winners to take out another SDRA premiership and is back on the track at Canberra today and Wagga on Friday.

Sports club tool kit

SPORT Australia has launched a suite of practical resources that focus on giving community sporting clubs and associations a roadmap for the safest return to sport at all levels.

Sport Australia's Return to Sport Toolkit, developed in partnership with Hockey Australia, comes with comprehensive checklists, adaptable COVID-19 safety plans and templates that can be used by sporting organisations at any level.

"Sport Australia recognises that many of our sporting clubs and associations are led by these wonderful people who now face very complex

decisions with limited resources to manage a safe return to sport.

Minister for Youth and Sport Richard Colbeck said sporting clubs and organisations across Australia will play an enormous part in getting the nation back on track as the nation recovers from the impact of COVID-19.

"The safe return of competition relies on a responsible rollout where everybody follows advice and takes precautions," Colbeck said.

"We have a big challenge ahead of us – but together the National Principles, the AIS framework and Sport Australia's toolkit offer tangible advice to ensure community sporting groups are prepared to control and deal with the virus in this new era."

STILL UP IN THE AIR

Hume League has opted to delay the season start until crowds of 300 are allowed while uncertainty surrounds the Riverina and Farrer leagues start.

WHILE Narrandera Eagles are due to give some clarity around a start date this week, Cootamundra electorate Labor candidate Mick Veitch has slammed the state government for leaving clubs stranded.

Riverina and Farrer league clubs were meeting this week to sort out a return to training and potential start date for the season.

An Eagles spokesperson said an official update would be available this week.

The NSW Labor Opposition has called on the Berejiklian Government to finally release their "return to play" plan for community sport and recreation facilities in the Cootamundra electorate, and give organisations certainty for the months ahead.

Despite calls from state sporting organisations for clear guidelines and the release of return to play plans from various states across the country, sport and recreation in NSW has been left to fend for themselves with Acting Minister Geoff Lee and the Office of Sport still refusing to present any clear guidelines or a return to play plan.

NSW Shadow Minister for Sport Lynda Voltz said sporting and recreation organisations have been left out in the cold by the Berejiklian Government.

"States across Australia have presented clear and manageable guidelines for the restart of sport and recreation, yet NSW once again has been left with no plan," Ms Voltz said.

"Where is the plan for football or gymnastics to return? Where is the plan for gyms to re-open?"

"Far from advocating on their behalf, Geoff Lee and the Office of Sport have told sport and recreation in NSW to work it out for themselves; it's unacceptable."

Labor spokesperson for the Cootamundra electorate Mick Veitch said local organisations are suffering deeply by the lack of clear guidelines for a return.

"Sport and recreation organisations are at the heart of every community in the Cootamundra electorate," Mr Veitch said.

"It's time Geoff Lee and the Office of Sport presented a clear plan for community sport and recreation to return."

"The thousands of participants in the Cootamundra electorate deserve to know when they can return to the field, court or gym."

Member for Cootamundra Steph Cooke said the current Public Health Orders do not prevent any sporting organisation from resuming training.

"NSW sporting organisations can start training immediately as long as they comply with the current Public

Health Orders, including training in maximum groups of 10 people and following the recommended physical distancing measures of 1.5 metres," Ms Cooke said.

"It is up to the sporting organisation to adapt or modify their sport, to be in line with the Public Health Orders."

The confusion around the return to play has resulted in Lockhart Demons Football and Netball club calling a "where we are up to" meeting for June 2 with AFL NSW regional manager Marc Geppart.

Demons president Bob Mathews issued a statement following a Hume Football League board meeting and media reports the season had been abandoned.

"At this time the position of the majority of clubs was that playing into October was not a preferred option," Mathews said.

"The Lockhart football club (and the league) will be guided by future government decisions and will call off the season at the appropriate time."

Mathews said senior football and netball players returned to training last week.

Hume Football League president Brendan l'Anson said the pressure needed to come off clubs and volunteers.

l'Anson said the Hume league would be delayed until at least 300 spectators could attend games.

"We have been through hell in the last three to four weeks with lots of questions, if, but and when," he said.

"Until we can get 300 people on the park, which makes it financially viable - we will play sport as soon as we can."

"We need to train and have that social aspect but we can't do it with no crowd. We can't have players playing in the 14s and then going straight home when mum's got netball and dad does the boundary for the seniors."

"We need to be mindful of our senior volunteers - we need to find 70 volunteers for jobs at every game."

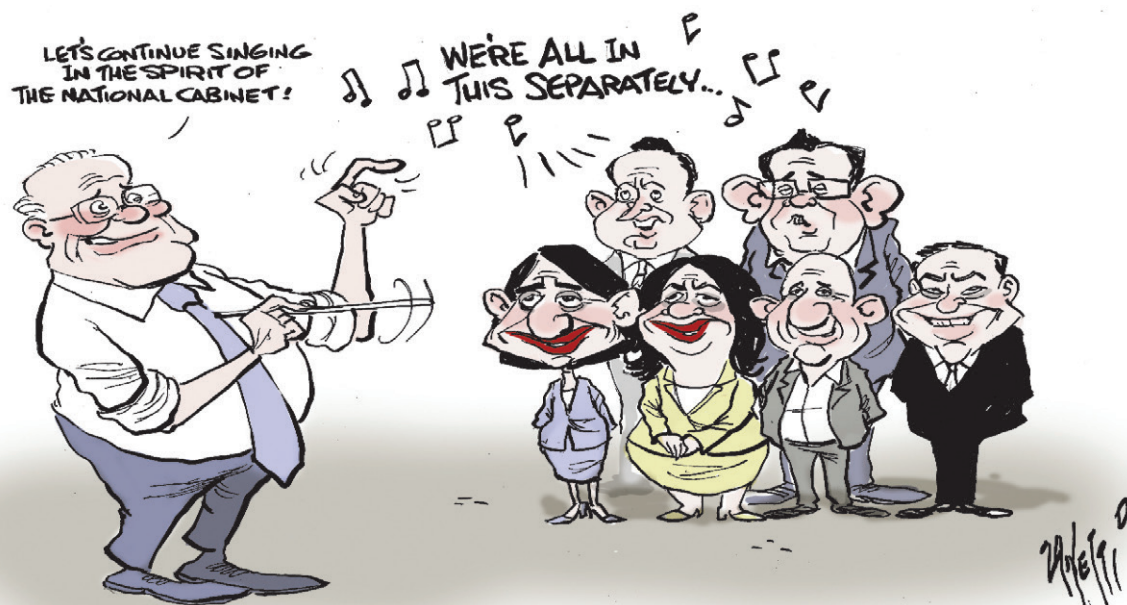
"The clubs said they didn't want the option of going into October so the option of a real season is almost gone."

l'Anson said many smaller clubs did not want to take a financial risk on a small gate.

"The Riverina and Farrer leagues have a few more weeks up their sleeve and there are less sides in that competition."

"They still haven't got a start date - we have presidents pretty stressed about what is happening."

"Stick with us, it is important to get sport going in some way shape or form as it is important to our country areas to do so."



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
